

Tenancy Spotlight

Housing (Scotland) Bill

When this new Bill becomes an Act, it will make changes in law in relation to housing.



Two elements I would like to highlight from the Bill are in regard to a) joint tenancies and b) tenancy agreements.

- a) An individual will be able to end a joint tenancy. Currently if you have a Private Residential Tenancy in joint names, you both have to terminate it and the remaining tenant can request to sign a new one. This change would make it a much easier and less painful an exercise especially in relationship breakdowns.
- b) The second element is giving Scottish Ministers the power to convert assured tenancies into Private Residential Tenancies (PRT). This would mean that all our tenants would be on a PRT. All new tenants from 2017 were given a PRT, but many remain on short assured or assured tenancy agreements. Full detail about how this will be implemented are expected to come when the Act is passed and we will understand the implications including in relation to deposits. It does again highlight how important it is that we are made aware of any tenancy changes or people over the age of sixteen living in our properties.

Coding for rent payments

The preferred method for paying your rent is by Standing Order to reduce errors. To ensure your rent payment is allocated to your property, please ensure to use the reference code that is in your Rent Review letter and takes the format of "Surname" - "Property Code". Property codes are 4 letters to represent your street name and 3 numbers to represent your house number. E.g. Mrs Oliphant of 36 Pedwarden Road would be "Oliphant - PERO 036". Mr Warthog of 62 Camilla Bell Crescent would be "Warthog - CBCR 062". Please contact the office if you are unsure of your reference code.

Meet the neighbours

In 2022, The Gannochy Trust offered two homes to displaced Ukrainian families through the Scottish Government Super Sponsor scheme. A third displaced Ukrainian family was homed in Gannochy when we opened our Housing List in June 2023. They provided an account of their journey to Perth which was included in the Centenary Time Capsule. In the season of good will, we have shared some excerpts from their story.

"We grew grapes in south Ukraine and lived in a small but cozy resort town. On February 24, 2022, at 4 am, we woke to explosions and the sound of an air raid siren. My name is Sergey, my wife Lilia is pregnant, we have a son, Peter, and a daughter, Sofia. On this day, a new page in our life began. We were lucky, we were unharmed and had each other, but had to flee our home with what we could carry. Hundreds of thousands of others were not so lucky. Two families took us in on our journey and made us part of their family and we

turned over a new page in our lives on a beautiful and foggy island. How little we knew about Scotland before, but seeing these magical hills and snow-white sheep on their slopes, we fell in love with this land without the slightest hesitation. However, the main wealth of this land turned out to be its inhabitants. These are people with a big heart and a kind soul.

The first year we learned to live in a new country and in new conditions, when everything we had remained in the past. But God did not leave us and we were able to find our narrow path to our new future. We had a wonderful son, David, and now there is one native Scotsman in our family. We learned the language and culture. We began to build our new life in a new country. In December 2023, our family was again very lucky to become a family of the Gannochy community and now we live under the roof of a century-old magical house. Our son studies at the RDM school in Scone and takes online piano lessons from New York from a teacher from Ukraine, whose fate is similar to ours, but her new home is now in the USA. Daughter Sofia has just started kindergarten and the youngest, David, is learning to ride a pedicab."

Gardener's Corner

As we are heading towards the final leg of the annual hedge cutting task, I would like to thank everyone for their efforts.

Tree management The Trust commissioned a survey of our trees across the whole estate which identified a number of trees that were dangerous or diseased and these are now being felled in phases for safety or to manage the spread of disease.

Dog Fouling With earlier sunsets, there's an increase in dog fouling on the estate creating both a health hazard and is unsightly. Dog faeces can include parasites that are harmful to young children as their immune systems are not fully developed. This is why dogs are not permitted in the Curly.

Winter Conditions Please take care in the winter conditions. The salting and gritting of unadopted roads and paths are the responsibility of the Trust and will be attended to on week days (excluding Christmas and New Year holidays). All other areas are the responsibility of the Council.



Christmas Lights The Estate looks magical at this time of year with all the Christmas trees and lights around the houses and gardens. Please remember to take them down from the rhone's and hedges by mid January so the grounds team can proceed with their cyclical cleaning and maintenance of hedges.

Winter procedures

Frozen pipes To avoid discomfort to you and your family, and to avoid damage to your house:

If you have an external boiler house, please ensure that the door is always kept closed in the winter months to protect your cold water supply, heating and hot water.

Find the location of the main supply stopcock so that you know where to switch the water off if there is a problem. They tend to be located under the kitchen sink or under the bathroom window.

Outside Tap To avoid burst pipes to your outside tap, switch off the gate valve that feeds the pipe and open the outside tap to drain the water from the pipe.

Gas leaks and carbon monoxide alarms

In the event of a gas leak or suspected gas leak, or if your carbon monoxide detector activates with a continuous alarm, please contact National Grid Gas Emergencies on 0800 111 999 immediately and please take the following steps;

- Turn off gas at meter (Quarter turn the handle on pipe at the side of the meter).
- Turn off all gas appliances.
- Don't use electrical appliances or light switches.
- Open all doors and windows.
- Don't smoke or use naked flames.

Don't turn supply back on until remedial action is taken and authorised by a competent person.
